The Dwarf Hotot breed and club have outpaced HRBI in rate of growth, and unfortunately the confusion over the Dwarf Hotot and the standard Hotot breeds seems to be growing.

Don't get me wrong. I like Dwarf Hotots. I own some, and have been a member of ADHRC since 1984. Other breeders who belong to our club also work with Dwarf Hotots.

When folks write to me about Dwarf Hotots, I'm happy to pass along what information I can, but it concerns me that this confusion exists and is growing. Suggestions, anyone?

Maybe we need to return to the name our breed started with: Blanc de Hotot. Like our rabbit, the name has a lot of class!

Add Maryland and Colorado to the list of states where Hotots are now being raised. New members in those states join breeders in about ten other states scattered around the country who have been working with our breed.

It has been a slow process, but gradually, more rabbit breeders are becoming acquainted with our medium size white rabbit with the black eye bands. Next year will mark the tenth anniversary of their arrival in the United States.

If you've been perusing your upcoming rabbit show listings lately, you have noticed that virtually every show listed is a county or state fair. If you haven't taken part in one of these before, you might want to give it a shot this year. We got our first exposure to Silver Martens at our county fair, and have been showing Martens at two different fairs for the past two years.

It takes a lot more work than your normal one-day show — in order to do a really good job, you need to check on your stock on a regular basis, have business cards ready to hand out, and be prepared to talk about your rabbits to a large number of curious visitors.

But having people waiting in line, money in

hand, to buy rabbits from you on the closing day of the fair is really nice. You also have the opportunity to pass on your knowledge of the rabbit industry to what is usually a very appreciative group of hard-working youth breeders.

Speaking of hard-working youth breeders, we have the makings of a Master Marten Breeder here in Michigan in our own Chad Burt. In addition to winning 7 BOB's, 7 BOS's, two Best Four Class awards, and two Best in Shows so far this year with both his Silver Martens and his Florida Whites, Chad was recently selected as Michigan's Rabbit King and is also the Michigan State Youth RBA Vice-President. Chad is currently leading in the SMRC Youth Sweepstakes points competition with over 3,000 points and should be well out in front in Quality Points as well.

I overheard a judge remark about a recent show that the youth Silver Martens could have beaten the open class Martens.

This is not only a tribute to the efforts of folks like Chad Burt and our other fine youth breeders, but to the open class breeders who cared enough to provide these kids with some first-class breeding stock to start with.
