I often have many questions and comments and I have more request for breeding stock than my does can give birth to. I often see some of the judges are thrilled to judge the Blanc de Hotots. The breeders in our club are working hard to improve the breed's quality, so I can't wait to see the breed's progress over the next several years.

The Blanc de Hotot Breeders International members have not only been busy with their rabbits, they also have been working hard for the club. The HRBI President will be appointing a standards committee as well as a By-laws committee. For any members who want to get involved, be sure to let the secretary know! Last but not least, several members have become very excited over the possibility of having some French Blanc de Hotots imported to the United States! Becky Clark in Indiana has found a breeder in France who is willing to join our cause. The French breeder is currently in contact with other Blanc de Hotot breeders in France are looking for several unrelated pairs from several different breeders in France. If anyone knows a good shipping agent or has experience importing, we would love to hear your advice. I am crossing my fingers we are able to import some rabbits into the United States with good fur! The main goal in importing new blood into the United States would be to get quality rabbits since our breed is small we want to be sure we are adding not only fresh blood into the breed, but quality as well. The original Blanc de Hotot fur is something any Blanc de Hotot breeder would drool over! The possibility of working with a French breeder to import Blanc de Hotots is certainly exciting news! Many breeders have practiced out-crossing when fresh bloodlines have not been available. This poses a specific challenge because the rabbits used to create the Blanc de Hotot are not the same rabbits we have today! Many of these breeds have evolved, so working with the breed now poses many new challenges. Luckily, there are many breeders who are dedicated to the breed and are willing to meet the challenges they pose. The best aspect of working with the Blanc de Hotot is the breed is evolving, so you can see the results of all your hard work and dedication.

## Holland Lop Rabbit Specialty Club

This will be one of my last columns for the Holland article in the Domestic Rabbit.

I have not been getting any feedback and I am unable to attend as many shows as I would like to. Therefore, I do not have anything to report. I am sure you get tired of my gift of gab. So if you are interested in serving in this capacity, contact your President (Dwayne Scott) and offer your services.

Congratulations to all you breeders that placed in the top 20 at the HLRSC National Show. If you managed to place one of your animals in the top 10 or 20, you did well and now know what to work on to go further up in the realm of showing.

For you new breeders of Hollands, you have chosen the right breed. I hope you began with good stock. Bone is very important in Hollands, you want those front legs to be short little tree trunks. You must begin with good type or you will never be happy. KNOW WHAT YOU ARE LOOKING FOR in your hollands. Holland type is short, compact, well balanced in length, width and depth.

You do not want extra length in the shoulders; in fact, the Holland appears not to have shoulders when you look at it from the side. The rear should be well rounded without pin bones when you feel it. You do not want to see a flat area over the hips. The head is round with a slight flattening between the eyes and muzzle. The head should be carried high and close to the shoulders. The ears should be short and hang close to the cheeks with the opening turned toward the head. You do not want thin or folded ears (this is where the ear control comes in) the crown should be just behind the top of the eye on top of the head. I have just described what we all want in our herd. When you buy stock you need to breed

to get that perfect Holland. Remember do not breed fault to fault. It is so important to look at the buck and doe and be sure they do not have the same fault such as weak crown or long shoulders, etc. Good Luck and if I can help along the way, you have my e mail.

The days are warmer now, be sure to protect your animals from the heat as much as possible and have good clean water in front of them at all times.

## Hotot Rabbit Breeders International

On April 6th here in Michigan, I woke up and found 4 inches of snow on the ground, oddly enough the water bottles didn't freeze! I can't wait for spring! I have had a few litters, here and there but a majority of my does were 1st time mothers. I think I will have much better results with their next litters. We

have had a harsh winter in Michigan, so my Blanc de Hotots really aren't prepared to start breeding yet. For those who have raised Blanc de Hotots, you know what I mean. Generally, they breed when all the conditions are perfect and don't do well with winter breeding. It seems as though no matter how much time I spend with them, they seem to show me they are going to do things their way no matter what plans I have. I am crossing my fingers for a good May and I will be breeding heavily for June so the 4-H kids can have projects for their fair. I've already been contacted for a market pen, so I will be letting my other rabbits take a break and my Blanc de Hotots will be my main focus!

If you've ever heard of a conversation about Blanc de Hotots, you may have noticed that many people do not know how to pronounce the name correctly. The name phonetically should be pronounced, "Oh-Toe." I have to admit I too was someone who slaughtered the pronunciation of the Blanc de Hotot name when I first inquired about raising the breed. I had to be in the world of the Blanc de Hotot breeders for a few years before I was able to pronounce their name correctly! Hearing the announcers call them over the loud speakers at shows can truly be an entertaining experience! I know I am also guilty of calling them by their "slang" name Standard Hotots which is also incorrect. Many may have read the column in the last DR where I referred to them as the Standard Hotot and that is a pet peeve to many Blanc de Hotot breeders. I personally started calling them by their abbreviated name after picking up the bad habit at a rabbit show. The name is Blanc de Hotot and this is a completely different breed than the Dwarf Hotot so the two breeds really are very different.

I believe this misinterpretation may have stemmed from some rabbit shows. I have been to shows where my name was called over the loud speaker to get my Dwarf Hotots on the table. Other shows, my comment cards were discarded when I did not arrive to the show table after the last call for Dwarf Hotots. I know filling out new comment cards is frustrating, but I don't think many ARBA members expect to see many Blanc de Hotots in their shows. For those who are planning on showing the Blanc de Hotots, please remember to be polite should any confusion arise around your entries. Coordinating a rabbit show can be stressful so that last thing we need to do is add more stress to the show staff. When I go to the shows and see people under stress and pressure, I usually try to pitch in and help any way I can. Sorting comment cards is always a good way to pitch in and meet those who work at the shows. It's also gives a rabbit person a true appreciation how much work is involved with actually putting on the rabbit show. I know I certainly have learned to look over my entry forms at least three times before handing them in. Then again, I always find a little stress and confusion leads to more attention on the show table. If
