Dear Editor:

I would like to pass on to the members a few things that I have found that works very well for me.

- 1. An easily grown plant, and very productive, that is a real treat for bunnies is Nasturtium. The entire plant is edible and especially enjoyed by the bun-
- 2. A quick external remedy for runny eves caused by bacterial infection of the tube between the eye and nose is a drop of combiotic (intermuscular type) commonly called or sold as penstrip. Dosage is a couple of times a day drop 2 drops in the affected eye.
- 3. When rats moved in on me and started eating in the feeders I took newspaper and crumpled it up and stuffed in the hoppers fitting snugly. I have not seen a rat in the feeders since. Be sure not to use any newspapers with colored ink as some may try to eat the newspaper.
- 4. Some of the most interesting and informative literature on rabbits comes from the OSU rabbit research center, Oregon State University, by Drs. Cheeke and Patton.
