Judging from mail directed to our club, the Dwarf Hotot has attracted attention and people's interest. Some correspondents have inquired as to how the Dwarf was developed from the Blanc de Hotot. As best as I have heen able to determine, there is no connection between the Dwarf and the "standard" Hotot.

The Hotot breed was developed by Madame E. Bernhard at Hotot-en-Auge in Normandy, northern France, in the early 1900's. Thus, the name derives from the place where the breed was developed after approximately 500 matings over several generations, working with Flemish Giants and Checkered Giants. It is my understanding that the Dwarf did not originate in France and was not developed from Hotots. Presumably, the black eye bands on the white Dwarf rabbit are what prompted the name "Dwarf Hotot."

Membership inquiries and sanction requests for Dwarf Hotots should be directed to American Dwarf Hotot Rabbit Club, Marylouise Cowan, Secretary-Treasurer, P.O. Box 54, Newagen, ME 04552.


The standards committee has submitted its recommendations to the board of directors and they will be sent for a general membership vote in the near future.
